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# **General Description**

The RX22 Receiver applies for DRX- and DPX-Spectrometers.

The RX22 Receiver is a further development of the ARX-Receiver. The new receiver works with the same intermediate frequency of 22MHz.

The entire receiver function is controlled by a microprocessor. Therefore accurate gain setting, phase and gain adjustment in the quadrature-module and other parameters are controlled via a RS485-Interface.

To achieve optimal leakage and RF performance, the entire receiver is mounted in a 19" HF case.

Calibration and production datas, known as the BBIS are stored in a flash EPROM direct on the board.

The most used parameter which is set by the operator is the receiver gain. The following description gives more information about the receiver gain.

#### **Receiver Gain**

The receiver gain (voltage gain) can be set within a range of 12 to 105 dB. The operator is used to setting the linear gain from the UXNMR. The following equation

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describes the context of the 'UXNMR Gain' and the logarithmic voltage gain of the receiver (between input and output).

$$Gain_{\rm UXNMR} = 10^{\left(\frac{Gain_{\rm RX} - 12}{20}\right)}$$

$$Gain_{RX}[dB] = 20 \cdot Log(Gain_{UXNMR}) + 12dB$$

The gain steps in the RX-22 Receiver are realized in different sections. In the rfsection, the gain can be switched in 12dB steps within a range of 36dB. In the IF-Section, a range of 48dB with 12dB steps can be set. The fine adjustment (1dB steps) are done with a pin diode attenuator (PAS) in the IF-Section.

The operator doesn't have to worry about setting the right switches. Just write down the wanted gain via the RS485 Interface, and the receiver will handle the different switches and the PAS itself.

The following table describes the internal control of the switches and the PAS for various UXNMR Gains.

#### **Quadrature Imagine Adjustment**

The quadrature imagine adjustment can be set via the RS485 Interface. Two different commands for gain adjust and phase adjust are implemented.

This two adjustments can be done with the RX22-Service-Tool. With the Gain Adjustment the gain difference between the in-phase and quad-phase channel is altered. With the Phase Adjustment, the phase difference between this two channels is set.

After optimizing this parameters the values can be stored on the board with the Save Config command. Even after a power up, the old stored values are activated. For proper operation of the RX22-Tool see chapter Submenu Quad Image Adjustment on page 29.

#### **Baseline Correction (DC-Offset)**

The acquired fid can be DC offset adjusted via the RS485 Interface. Two different commands for each channel are implemented.

The two offset adjustment can be done with the RX22- Service Tool. A DC-Offset voltage is added to the NF amplifier in the AF-Section. This adjustment can be done individually for each channel A and B.

After optimizing this parameters the values can be stored on the board with the Save Config command. Even after a power up, the old stored values are activated. For proper operation of the RX22-Tool see chapter Submenu Quad Image Adjustment on page 29.




Figure 1.1. Installation RX-22





Figure 1.2. RS485 Connector Pin Assignment

#### Board Z4P2953:

- Ju15 and Ju16 switch different supply voltages to the RS interface. They must be in the same position.

If they are placed closer to the front panel (Position A) than the RS interface is supplied with an external RS485\_12V supply voltage. This voltage is connected to the RS485 plug on pin14,15 positive 12V and pin 6,7 GND.

If they are placed closer to the back plane (Position B) then the internal digital +5V Voltage supplies the RS interface section. (Caution no galvanic isolation)

- Ju7 and Ju8 select the RS input channel. They must be in the same position.


If the position of both jumpers is closer to the front panel (Position A) than the RX22 serves a RS485 interface on the RS485 plug.

If the position of both jumpers is closer to the back plain (Position B) than the RX22 serves a RS232 interface on the RS232 pin plug.

# FunctionDescription

### **RF-Section**

The RF-Section is built as a low noise broadband input module with various gain steps. The gain can be set in 12dB steps from -12 to +24dB. The pin diode switches, which handle the various amplifiers, are controlled from the microprocessor.

The image rejection mixer converts the wanted signal down to the IF band. The carrier and one of the sidebands will be cancelled at the output port. Therefore the IMR mixer provides also a good SSB noise suppression.

The following 25MHz lowpass suppresses the unwanted LO leakage signal from the IF-Section and prevents saturation of the following amplifiers

The four RF amplifier control signals are filtered with smoothing capacitors since ECL04. This capacitors act like lowpasses.





Figure 3.1. .RF-Section






The IF-Section is built as a selective amplifier with different gain steps. In the first stage a 20dB or a 8dB amplifier can be activated.

A two stage bandpass filter with a 0.3dB bandwidth of 1MHz suppresses all unwanted signals. The pin diode attenuator (PAS) allows fine gain adjustment. The following stage consists of 4 switchable amplifiers for coarse gain steps from -4 to +32dB.

#### AF-Section

In the AF-Section the signal is converted down to the audio frequency band. The quadrature mixer produces in-phase and the quad-phase output signals. The optimal 90 degree local oscillator phase shift is controlled by software, therefore the quadrature imagine can be optimized from the computer and no hardware trimming is necessary. Also equal gain in both channels is adjustable by software.

The temperature of the quadrature module is measured and regulated to a constant value of about 65 degree celsius with boards till ECL01. The temperature in later designs is held stable to 55 degree celsius.

RX22 Controller Section	
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#### Microcontroller

The Microcontroller system consists of a 80C535 12MHz Microcontroller, a 32K \* 8 Bit Static RAM, a 128K \* 8 Bit paged FLASH EEROM and a 12MHz clock generator. The external bus interface of the 80C535 consists of an 8-bit data bus, a 16bit address bus and five control lines. The address latch enable signal (ALE) is used to demultiplexing address and data of port 0. The program memory is accessed by the program store enable signal (PSEN~) twice a machine cycle. The read or write strobe (RD~, WR~) is used for accessing the external data memory.

#### Address Decoder

The address decoder controls the microcontroller program and data memory accesses. It enables/disables depending on the address and control signals different devices. Normally, the uP boots from the lower page of the FLASH memory and runs its application software from the upper page. The PSEC~ control signal is asserted by the uP while the uP downloads new application software or stores new BBIS or configuration data. This mapes the FLASH memory into the data segment and the RAM into code segment. The uP accesses now the RAM as it were a nonvolatile code memory. Therefore, program instructions are copied from the boot partition of the FLASH memory to the RAM before starting the download procedure.

The uP may access several devices as data memory. Its own RAM(Address 0x2000..0x7FFF), the latch for the PAS D/AC(located at 0x8000), the latch for the phase adjustment D/AC(located at 0x8001), the latch for the gain adjustment


D/AC(located at 0x8002), the latch for the RF control signal driver(located at 0x8006) and the latch for the IF and G2 control signal driver(located at 0x8007).

A special mode allows the download of the boot software into the lower page of the FLASH memory. The boot software is copied in the test department from an EPROM to the FLASH. The boot partiton is in normal operation mode protected from unwanted program and erase operations.

Non volatile Code Memory

The RX22 receiver uses a new FLASH technology, a 128K \* 8 block wide erase/ programmable non volatile Memory. The address space is separated into four blocks, each block is insystem erase-, and programmable. Data in the boot block is protected from unwanted erase/program operations if jumper JU2 is not placed (normal operation).

Parameterblock 1 and 2 contain BBIS(Bruker Board Information System) data, calibration data for gain steps and values stored with the "save config" command. Only one parameterblock is valid at a time, the other is erased and will be written with the next save config or update BBIS data command.

The uP software manages which parameter block is actual valid.

The application or main block contains the application software. It is possible to make an insystem update of the receiver software version. The download software is stored in the boot block and copied to the low page of the RAM before a download starts. The uP will then disable PSEC (Program SECurity) and while PSEC is low access the RAM as code memory and the FLASH as data memory (address decoder).

#### **RS-485** Interface

Communication to the RX22 receiver is achieved via the RS485 interface. The RS485 is a full duplex differential interface which allows to connect several transceivers to the same wires. The interface is realized by seperate transmit and receive lines. A extra wakeup line may activate a hardware reset on the RX22. This line is driven from the RS485 master.

All signals in the RS interface are galvanic isolated with optocoupler circuits. The supply voltage for the galvanic isolation delivers the RS485 Master. A voltage regulator placed in the interface section generates +5V Vcc out of the 12V on the RS485 plug. Data collisions in a network with several slaves is avoided with the TX\_EN signal. The uP switches its transmit outputs into tristate (high impedance mode) after the end of each data transmission.

The default baud rate is set to 9600 Baud. One startbitt, no parity, one stopbit




Figure 3.5. RS485- Transmission

#### **I2C Interface**

The RX22 I2c interface is not any longer connected to the I2c bus in the AQR rack. The hardware change is made to avoid I2c bus collisions in the AQR. This change is valid from RX22 with ECL02.

All components for the I2c interface are not placed since ECL02, the RX22 does not support I2c bus functions anymore.

#### Reset and Power uP Logic

A supply voltage controller monitors the digital supply voltage (+5V). If the supply voltage drops below 4.5V a hardware reset automatically takes place. When switching on the power supply, the voltage monitor releases the RESET~ signal after a time delay. This allows the quartz oscillator building-up the 12MHz system clock.

Different reset sources drive the RESET~ signal after the power up. The regular reset switch placed on the board for manual resets, the RS\_WUP~ (RS485 Wake up) and a EP~. All those sources may initiate a hardware reset. The Controller is because of disturbance reasons held in a reset state during the whole acquisition of NMR data(EP~ active).

The uP system boots after each reset. While the uP boots, the RX22 does not serve the serial interface. Any data received on the serial RS485 interface is ignored.

The boot time must be considered by any application or testing software.

The boottime consists of two separates time delaies. The hardware delay caused by the Power monitor ~15msec and the boot time of the uP system software.


#### **Clock Oscillator**

The uP is driven from a 12MHz oscillator. Two possible circuits may be used. If R158 and R194 are placed on the board, the uP uses its internal timing circuits. The uP makes it possible to turn off the clock with a software instruction. Leaving this deep power down mode is achieved with a hardware reset.

If R101, R106 and R108 are placed on the board, the uP uses the external clock oscillator. This oscillator turns off while EP~ is active low. Leaving this mode is achieved with the positive state of the EP~ and a resulting hardware reset through EP~. A special software mode disables the EP~ reset and clock turning off. This mode is asserted with software instructions to allow phase, gain and baseline adjustment while the acquisition is on. It is also for tunning, matching and 'gs' procedures.





Explanation:

1. A Acquisition activates EP\_RX~. EP\_RX~ triggers a hardware reset in the reset logic and switches the clock oscillator off.

2. Disabling EP\_RX~ releases the clock oscillator, the clock oscillator starts building up the 12MHz clock frequency.

3. Disabling EP\_RX~ releases the reset logic input, the reset logic pulls RESET~ high after a certain time delay.

4. The uP switches EP\_BNK(EP\_BlaNK) on. An EP\_RX~ does not result anything in the uP system. This mode is entered for phase- and gain adjustment only.

#### Gain settings

The receiver gain depends on the RF, IF, G2 and PAS settings. The uP switches on the MSA amplifiers in the HF-Section by executing a data memory write cycle to the proper address of the RF or IF and G2 latch. Two drivers supply the MSA amplifiers with the required currents.

The PAS setting makes a fine calibration of the receiver gain possible. The digital PAS value is latched and digital/analog converted with a DAC08. The analog voltage(U\_AGC) is then brought to a voltage controlled attenuator PAS\_1.

#### Phase and Gain Adjustment

Fine calibration of the phase and gain in the quad module is adjustable by software.

Both adjust signals result of a digital/analog conversion. The digital values are latched and then converted with two DAC08. The PHASE\_ADJ(TP6) signal controls a capacitance diode(D5), the GAIN\_ADJ(TP1) signal controls a field-effect transistor (T1) in the AF section.

The uP may measure the temperature in the quad module. This temperature is regulated to keep phase and gain drift caused by temperature drift in the quad module as low as possible. The temperature sensor Ref02 is placed in the quad modul, it converts temperature to voltage. A Operational amplifier(IC56) spreads the temperature voltage to the full scale (0..+5V) uP A/DC range(TP15). The uP can compress its internal reference voltage range (set automatically by software) to achieve a higher resolution(~10 bit => 0.01Kelvin, full range 0..5V on TP15 => 20Kelvin).

The effective temperature in the modul is then calculated by software using the conversion result and the reference value of the temperature regulator.

#### LEDs

Some LED's on the front panel of the board signal the state of the RX22. Two LED's display the uP status, two LED's monitor the supply voltage.

Possible combinations of the READY and ERROR LED are described in table LED Description on page 26.

The +5V LED monitors the digital +5V supply. The LED is on when the observed +5V voltage is correct.

The +-15V LED monitors the positive- and negative 15V supply for the analogue section. The LED is on when both, the +15V and the -15V voltage are correct.

Another LED is placed inside the RX22 HF-Cassette. This LED is not visible. To control the LED, the cover plate has to be removed. This LED monitors the positive- and negative 15V supply for the quad image module. The LED is on when both, the +15V and the -15V voltage are correct.

A service tool running under UNIX supports some RX22 functions. This tool can be started by typing rx22 under UNIX or by opening a shell(term) and typing rx22 under openwindows. This tool supports user, service and testing function.

### Receiver Gain

This command reads and writes the RX22 receiver gain. The gain corresponds to the UXNMR gain(1.0..46341.0).

### Submenu Quad Image Adjustment

Entering this menupoint will open a new menu where gain, phase and baseline adjustment for the quad module may be done. Before the new menu structure appears on the screen, the tool inhibts hardware resets and clock oscillator shoot downs caused by an active EP~(Acquisition) (see explanation Reset and Clock Oscillator).

Leaving this menu will again switch the EP~ logic on.

#### Initialize Default Values:

The RX22 receiver initializes itself with default values. New default values can be obtained by the Save Configuration command (see below). Executing an Initialize reloads all settings with default values. The receiver is in a defined state (power up) after the init command

#### Save Configuration:

The RX22 receiver stores the current settings as its default into a non volatile data memory. The RX22 receiver sets the default values after an "Initialize" command or a power up.

#### Quad image Gain Adjust:

This command reads and writes the gain adjust value in the quad module. The resolution is +-3.2 percent of the current gain.

#### Increment Quad Image Gain:

The quad image gain value is incremented with the smallest possible D/A converter resolution. Use this function for fine adjusting.

#### Decrement Quad Image Gain:

The quad image gain value is decremented with the smallest possible D/A converter resolution. Use this function for fine adjusting.

#### Quad image Phase Adjust:

This command reads and writes the phase adjust value in the quad module. The adjustable phase is +-5 degrees.

#### Increment Quad Image Phase:

The quad image phase value is incremented with the smallest possible D/A converter resolution. Use this function for fine adjusting.

#### Decrement Quad Image Phase:

The quad image phase value is decremented with the smallest possible D/A converter resolution. Use this function for fine adjusting.

#### **Offset Channel A:**

This command reads and writes the channel A offset adjustment. The channel A low frequency output of the quad module is DC offset adjustable. The valid range is from 0 to 255.

#### Increment Offset AF-Channel A:

The AF offset voltage for the channel A is incremented with the smallest possible D/A converter resolution. Use this function for fine adjusting.

#### Decrement Offset AF-Channel A:

The AF Offset voltage for the channel A is decremented with the smallest possible D/A converter resolution. Use this function for fine adjusting.

#### **Offset Channel B:**

This command reads and writes the channel B offset adjustment. The channel B low frequency output of the quad module is DC offset adjustable. The valid range is from 0 to 255.

#### Increment Offset AF-Channel B:

The AF offset voltage for the channel B is incremented with the smallest possible D/A converter resolution. Use this function for fine adjusting.

#### Decrement Offset AF-Channel B:

The AF Offset voltage for the channel B is decremented with the smallest possible D/A converter resolution. Use this function for fine adjusting.

Submenu I2C AQR Functions

4.3

The RX22 does not support any AQR I2c functions.

The firmware software on the RX22 board is automatically checked and if necessary downloaded with the latest firmware version. Dependencies between firmware and hardware are controlled by the tool software. Do always execute an autodownload after receiving a new firmware tape.

#### Submenu Service

4.5

This menu contains various functions like debug-, service- and test department function. Some function are reserved for authorized persons and can not be accessed by a regular user.

#### Initialize Default Values:

The RX22 receiver initializes itself with default values. New default values can be obtained by the Save Configuration command (see below). Executing an Initialize reloads all settings with default values. The receiver is in a defined state (power up) after the init command

#### Delete Error:

Some errors may occur during runtime of the RX22 receiver. All this errors announced by the Rx22 must be acknowledged. The RX22 receiver refuses operation as long as an error is not deleted. This functions deletes one error.

#### Download:

An update of the application software in the RX22 receiver, is insystem possible. This function starts the download procedure. Normally the application software is loaded in the test department and must not be updated.

#### Save Configuration:

The RX22 receiver stores the current settings as its default into a non volatile data memory. The RX22 receiver sets the default values after an "Initialize" command or a power up.

#### Version Config:

This command gets the RX22 receiver hard- and software configuration and displays it on the screen.

#### Measure Quad Module Temperature:

Selecting this menupoint triggers a temperature measurement in the quad module. The uP receives a analog voltage on his A/DC input pin which corresponds to the current temperature in the quad module. The reference value in the temperature regulating circuit is 2.5V equal to 65 or 55 degrees Celsius. (Depends on the hardware index, Z3P2953 and Z3P2953A 65 degrees, , Z3B2953B, Z3P2953C or newer 55 degrees celsius.) This menupoint contains commands about board information and calibration data. Each board is individual adjusted and calibrated in the test department. Calibration data is then stored in the non-volatile data memory. Selecting this menupoint opens a new menu with the following commands:

#### Read BBIS to Screen:

The receiver BBIS(Bruker Board Information System) data is displayed on the screen. BBIS contains production, testing, hard- and software versions data.

#### Read BBIS to File:

The receiver BBIS(Bruker Board Information System) data is written to a file and may be edited with a normal ASCII editor like vi or emacs. BBIS contains production, testing, hard- and software versions data.

#### Write BBIS from File:

The receiver non-volatile data memory is loaded with new BBIS data. Normally the test department writes valid data to the board after production or repair.

Caution: The BBIS data memory may contain non-valid data if a unauthorized user selects this menupoint. The old data will be irretrievable lost. For use of authorized persons only!!!

#### Read Calibration Data to File:

The Receiver has a gain table stored in his data memory. This table includes RF, IF and G2 amplifier settings and PAS D/AC values for all Gain steps. The command creates a ASCII file containing the gain table.

#### Write Calibration Data from File:

The receiver non-volatile data memory is loaded with a new gain table. The table is determined individually for all receiver in the test department.

Caution: The gain table is essential for a correct operation of the RX22 receiver. A wrong table disables any normal operation, the board must then be adjusted again in the test department. Old calibration data is irretrievable lost after executing this command. For use of authorized persons only!!!

#### Submenu Debug EP~ Blank:

Entering into this point opens a new menu. This menu is made for debug and test functions. It also inhibits the EP~ hardware reset and shoot down of the clock os-cillator while the EP~ pulse is active. Leaving this menu switches the EP~ logic

on. The ERROR LED on the front panel off the RX22 blinks while this submenu is active. This is a warning that the acquired spectra may be disturbed by the uP system.

4.5.2

### Init:

The RX22 receiver initializes itself with default values. New default values can be obtained by the Save Configuration command (see below). Executing an Initialize command loads all settings with values from the non volatile EEPROM and sets the RX22 in a defined state. (Power up).

### Delete Error:

Some errors may occur during runtime of the RX22 receiver. All this errors announced by the RX22 must be acknowledged. The RX22 receiver refuses operation as long as an error is not deleted. This functions deletes one error.

### Save Configuration:

The same as described above. New adjustment values may be stored to the nonvolatile datamemory. Those values will then be treated as new default values after a power up or hardware reset.

#### **Receiver Gain:**

This command reads and writes the RX22 receiver gain. The gain corresponds to the UXNMR gain(1.0..46341.0).

### Debug RF, IF and G2 setting:

This command writes a bitpattern to the RF, IF and G2 UDN2982 driver. It is possible to switch on any amplifier combinations (resulting a unique gain) in the receiver.

The bitpattern has a 10 bit size, the input data is in hexadecimal code starting with 0x. The lower nibble(bit0..bit3) switches directly the RF\_M12DB, RF\_0DB, RF\_12DB and RF\_24DB amplifier on/off. The middle nibble (bit4..bit7) switches directly the IF\_M4DB, IF\_8DB, IF\_20DB and IF\_32DB amplifier on/off. The higher nibble switches directly the G2\_8DB and G2\_20DB amplifier on/off.

Example: 0x241(binaer 10'0100'0001) switches the RF\_0DB, the IF\_20DB and the G2\_20DB amplifier in the HF section on. All other MSA are switched off.

### AGC Voltage:

This command writes a new AGC Value(PAS) to the D/AC. Normally the PAS value is set with a regular Receiver Gain instruction. The PAS value for all gainsteps is individually saved for all receivers in a table.

#### Phase Adjust:

This command reads and writes the phase adjust value in the quad module. The adjustable phase is +-5 degrees.

#### Gain Adjust:

This command reads and writes the gain adjust value in the quad module. The resolution is +-3.2 percent of the current gain.

#### **Offset Channel A:**

This command reads and writes the channel A offset adjustment. The channel A low frequency output of the quad module is DC offset adjustable. The valid range is from 0 to 255.

### Offset Channel B:

This command reads and writes the channel B offset adjustment. The channel B low frequency output of the quad module is DC offset adjustable. The valid range is from 0 to 255.

### Submenu Gain functions

4.5.3

Some gain functions are implemented to make the tuning and matching procedure as easy as possible. Some of this functions will not set a new RX22 gain, they do just inform the tuning software about the gain table in the RX22. This menu is for debug reasons only.

### Submenu Diagnostic:

This submenu contains debug functions for bug fixing. More functions will be implemented with a later firmware release.

## RX22 Software Release Note

### Fixed Bugs:

1. The AF offset adjust value was not correct reloaded after a power up. The software loaded the D/A converter with the hexadecimal complementary value. All adjust values will now be read correct and set properly on the hardware. Make sure that all settings of an adjusted RX22 are saved to the non volatile memory with the "save config" command in the rx22 tool.

### New Facts:

- New commands are implemented to make a fine quad image adjustment possible. The digital values for the D/A converters on the RX22 are incremented / decremented with the smallest possible resolution (1 LSB). The new features are located in the rx22 service tool version 940614, quad image adjustment menu.
- 2. In normal operation, the digital part of the receiver RX22 is shoot down during acquisitions. A special mode is implemented to achieve full operation also when an EP is active. This special mode was made for tuning and matching procedures. When the RX22 switchs to the "Disable EP Logic mode on", the ERROR LED on the front panel starts blinking. This is a warning for the user, it reminds him that the uP system is working and that the acquired spectra may be disturbed by the uP clock oscillator or other frequency products. The UXN-MR enters into the "Disable EP Logic mode" when a tuning or matching procedure or the gs mode is activated.
- 3. The temperature in the receiver RX22 quad image module is reduced to 55 degrees celsius for all RX22 with board index Z3P2953B and Z3P2953C. The monitored temperature adapts this fact to the new temperature calculation.
